Groulx MNA Claude Surprenant kicked out of CAQ caucus

Suffers fallout from ex-political assistant's alleged misappropriations

(NSN) Despite a press release statement issued by Groulx CAQ MNA Claude Surprenant last week, suggesting that a political aide was largely responsible for a misappropriation of funds in his riding office, CAQ leader François Legault announced on Tuesday earlier this week that Surprenant was no longer a member of the party caucus.

Out of CAQ caucus

Legault's decision came after he had declined to censure Surprenant just the day before. "If only we could all be perfect," he told La Presse on Monday. However, by Tuesday he admitted he could no longer ignore the sheer weight of evidence appearing to implicate Surprenant.

"When someone makes an error in good faith it's not same thing as when someone

makes five errors in good faith," he said. While Surprenant suggested that his former political assistant, Julie Nadeau, had mismanaged a petty cash fund he allotted her in the form of blank cheques, Nadeau fired back that she had been secretly doing partisan work for the CAQ while in the employ of the National Assembly.

Blank cheque accounting

In a report on the situation, a National Assembly ethics commissioner acknowledged Nadeau's role, but also chastised Surprenant for issuing the blank cheques to Nadeau. "This sort of practice is in direct contradiction to basic comptroller principles," the accountant wrote in the report.

More recently, Surprenant also acknowledged making false expense claims to the National

Assembly for travel costs, hotel bills for his family in Quebec City at a time when the National Assembly wasn't in session, and that he awarded a \$700 contract to his wife who is an architect to redo his riding office following the 2014 election.

Surprenant's view

For his part, Surprenant said in his Canada News Wire press release that in December 2015 "I noticed the presence of irregularities in the riding bank account. In the following weeks, Mrs. Nadeau, who was in charge of the transactions in that account, pledged to reimburse the sums which had disappeared from the account. However, nothing was done and she went off on sick leave."

Surprenant said Nadeau had initially agreed



to submit to the accountant's scrutiny. Although Nadeau maintains that she was never contacted by the accountant, Surprenant claims the accountant tried numerous times to contact her, but was never able to so.

Ex-CAQiste Claude Surprenant to sit as independent

Groulx MNA pledges to continue representing constituents

(NSN) Following his removal last Tuesday from the Coalition Avenir Québec caucus by party leader François Legault, Groulx MNA Claude Surprenant says he will be sitting from now on as an independent and that he wants to reassure the riding's constituents that he will always be available to them.

"The citizens of Groulx did me a great honour by making me their representative in the National Assembly two-and-a-half years ago, and for that I will be eternally grateful," Surprenant said in a statement on Wednesday.

Pledges to go on

"Today I would like to say to them that never will I let them down. Since my election my priority has been and will remain the same: the Quebecers from my riding for whom I will fight without relenting. You can be sure of one thing: the local priority dossiers will go all the way to the National Assembly where I will continue to go after the Liberal government."

Since last Tuesday, Surprenant hasn't been a member of the CAQ following allegations made by an ex-employee. CAQ leader Legault said he is waiting for an investigation by an ethics

commissioner to conclude before deciding on the possible return of Surprenant within the party fold.

'Today I would like to say to them that never will I let them down'

Ready to cooperate

"I was subjected to public and media sanction because of things being attributed to me," Surprenant continued. "I am nonetheless ready to cooperate with the ethics commissioner and with the authorities at the National Assembly, notably by submitting all of my expense accounts. I am thinking of all my constituents, who must have many questions. I can assure you that all the necessary light will be shed on this dossier and that until then I am still your man."

Trudeau's challenges: Trump, taxes and energy

Canada's tax and energy advantages are coming to a sudden end, and we should expect businesses will move more investment to the U.S.

When Justin Trudeau shuffled his federal cabinet last week, it signaled he's taking the next United States president seriously. Finding the right mix of people to work with White House officials is important. But government policies also matter. Our prime minister will need to do more to keep Canada competitive and protect Canadian jobs.

Donald Trump is ready to upend U.S. policy on everything from trade to defence treaties to immigration. But the president-elect's domestic proposals on taxes and energy are Canada's greater challenges.

The Trump administration intends to move quickly to cut the business tax rate from 35 to 15 per cent. Add the four per cent average corporate tax applied by state and local governments and the new U.S. tax rate could soon effectively be a cool

19 per cent, about eight points lower than Canada's 27 per cent average when federal and provincial rates are combined.

Our country's tax advantage is coming to a sudden end. As a result, we should expect businesses will invest more in the United States and less in Canada, where higher costs exist.

This brings us to energy. Trudeau wants all provinces to put a price on carbon, directly with a carbon tax or indirectly with cap-and-trade regulations. If the provinces don't, Trudeau will impose a carbon tax. The impact of either strategy is the same: more expensive for Canadians to get around, heat their homes and keep the lights on. Pricing carbon will increase the cost of almost everything, including food.

A typical Canadian family will likely pay more than \$1,200 a year in new energy taxes by 2022 - and twice that if Ottawa decides to apply its new tax aggressively.

Carbon pricing isn't the only way Trudeau's policies will raise electricity rates. His order to provincial governments to shutter coal-fired stations by 2030 will eliminate a source of cheap and reliable power from Canada's energy mix. Here's what that means for one small province: New Brunswick has a single coal-burning power plant and NB Power officials have said closing it would increase provincial electricity rates by a staggering 38 per cent.

Meanwhile, U.S. ratepayers face no carbon tax. And American energy costs will likely fall as Trump repeals President Barack Obama's execu-

tive orders restricting the extraction and use of fossil fuels.

What's Ottawa's response to all this?

Trudeau says Canada could win if the incoming president rejects plans to make U.S. energy more expensive. He told a Calgary business audience last month, "We know that this is the way the world is going and if the United States wants to take a step back from it, quite frankly, I think we should look at that as an extraordinary opportunity for Canada and for Canadians."

It's a brave face - but does it make sense?

Trump's energy policies twinned with deep tax cuts will reduce Canada's competitiveness.

Canadian policy-makers, and the prime minister, don't have to like this change and may privately curse it. But our federal and provincial governments can't pretend Trump's policy agenda won't have any impact on the economy when Canadian jobs are at risk.

Canada's energy sector is already concerned that government policy will soon put our country at a competitive disadvantage, and that investment and jobs will move to the U.S.

In Ontario, some businesses are already eyeing nearby U.S. states with more affordable energy prices. Ontario electricity prices have skyrocketed thanks to costly provincial regulations. Carbon pricing means bills for natural gas, gasoline and diesel are going up next. The Coalition of Concerned Manufacturers of Ontario, a group of small- and medium-sized businesses, has raised the alarm and is urging the government to reverse course or risk job losses.

Canada's long-term growth depends on its businesses remaining competitive. Affordable energy is part of the mix, along with reasonable tax rates. Likewise, the prosperity of Canadian families is impacted by the price of home heating fuels, power and gas. Dramatic price increases leave households poorer, while inexpensive energy would mean households have more income for other things.

With Canadian energy prices set to increase relative to U.S. prices, there will soon be an additional cost to Canada's carbon policy. That price is less investment and lost jobs. Lower U.S. taxes will only compound the problem.

Canadian workers and businesses can't afford such a shift.

The Trudeau government's next move should be to overhaul its carbon pricing plan to account for the policy shift south of the border. Canada needs a strategy that doesn't penalize businesses and ordinary Canadians.

It's time for feds to show real leadership on autism

Adding another level of bureaucracy is no answer for too many families left for too long without support

As a parent of a child diagnosed with autism more than a decade ago, I've watched the provincial and federal policy debates about autism with great interest - and even greater disappointment.

Although I used to believe that one of the things that made Canada a great country was its publicly-funded health-care system, my son's diagnosis opened my eyes to discrimination under medicare. There's no cure for autism. But solid peer-reviewed evidence has shown for decades that intensive behaviour intervention (IBI), based on the principles of applied behaviour analysis (ABA), can have a dramatic impact on the development of kids with autism.

Unfortunately, the treatment is not covered by medicare across the country.

In most provinces, IBI/ABA is not offered by ministries of health to those who need it, when they need and for as long as they need it. When programs are available, they're typically offered by ministries of social services and are extremely limited. They're also plagued by unconscionable wait lists - often years long.

My family spent more than \$40,000 on such therapy in the private sector in the first year while waiting for government-provided treatment for our son. This wasn't sustainable for us, nor is it for most Canadians.

More recently, when I inquired about placing our son in a group home in Ontario, I was told he couldn't be placed on a list until he's 18 - and the average waiting period is a decade long. Such dramatic waits for care facilities for adults with autism is replicated across the country.

So what kind of leadership has the federal government demonstrated on this file? Not much.

But recently, they've been invited to embrace a new proposal.

In November, an expert working group on autism created by the previous federal government presented their final report to Health Minister Jane Philpott. A proposed business plan for a Canadian Autism Partnership (CAP) and a request for support, at \$19 million over five years, was put forth. Philpott now must determine whether to proceed with this autism partnership model.

Unfortunately, CAP doesn't offer autism families relief.

CAP gives an overview of its proposed structure (board of directors, national director, 11 employees, advisory council), a mission (address issues related to autism using a shared leadership approach), and a process (consultations, issue identification, agenda setting, problem-solving, mobilization, evaluation, measurement, monitoring) - but that's about it.

In other words, the proposal involves the creation of another bureaucracy.

Those involved with the working group and supporters may be excited about a new bureaucracy, but many in the autism community - myself included - shake their heads in disbelief.

The last thing autism families need is more bureaucracy. What we need from the federal government is real leadership on autism - now.

The CAP proposal raises numerous concerns and risks.

First, the plan doesn't mention specific gaps in policy or priority issues, and it doesn't give concrete examples of how such issues could be resolved with the new model or when.

Second, we already have a public health agency and a federal Department of Health. Are these institutions and their provincial counterparts not adequate to conduct consultations, collaboration, problem-identification and decision-making? A new bureaucracy will likely render the possibility of concrete action to resolve policy and program gaps across the country even more remote.

Third, the CAP model doesn't actually provide the partnership with any authority to make changes to public policy. And it certainly won't have the resources or legislative power to make meaningful decisions.

Instead of a new bureaucratic structure, Philpott should consider how the federal government can demonstrate leadership, exercise influence and put some money on the table to negotiate an accord with the provinces that would address three recurring issues as priorities for autism families:

the lack of health-care (medicare) coverage for autism treatment (ABA/IBI);

the lack of ABI/IBI in the school systems;

the lack of appropriate housing accommodation for autistic adults.

Where there is a political will to do something, there is a way. Too many families have been left without support for too long.



Pool project update

A tree and shrub cutting operation that took place last summer along the shore of the Rivière-des-Mille-Îles at the southern end of Eighth Ave. was the subject of discussion during question period at the Jan. 19 public meeting of Deux-Montagnes city council.

Also during question period, Mayor Denis Martin was asked by Yves Bonhomme of 7th Ave. to provide an update on the city's planned swimming pool project which is being conducted in conjunction with Sainte-Marthe-sur-le-Lac.

"It seems to be coming along well," the mayor replied. "A request for a subsidy was made in

the context of a federal/provincial program, and we are meeting with the federal and provincial elected representatives regularly to get that subsidy with the City of Sainte-Marthe. That's what missing for us to get the project going."

The mayor said he was hopeful that by this summer or autumn, if all goes well, the results of lobbying by the two municipalities should start

to show results. According to the terms of most federal/provincial/municipal agreements for sharing the costs of such projects, Ottawa and Quebec usually pay for two-thirds. In this case, Deux-Montagnes and Sainte-Marthe would split the last third of the bill evenly.

City manager explains

"It's an important subsidy that we're trying to get before moving forward," said city manager Benoit Ferland. "A lot of residents have been asking us and some have even been writing us. But if we move forward right away the costs that we commit to will not be subsidized. They subsidize only what they authorize. For example, if we did the plans right away they wouldn't pay for the plans. We are waiting to obtain the authorization from Quebec and Ottawa."

Tree cutting by the river

Peter Largie of Lakebreeze St. raised the issue after putting in a request for a city hall document he believed would shed light on the cutting operation. He was told during the council meeting by municipal clerk Jacques Robichaud that the city had only document on file relevant to the situation.

In an interview following the meeting, Largie referred to the tree cutting as “savage and where they clear cut trees that were completely healthy, but at the same time they destroyed animals that had lived there – birds of all sorts. And now that’s something which has disappeared.” Largie said he had been unable so far to identify those responsible for the cutting operation, although he planned to ask the provincial environmental ministry to become involved.

Man shot, wounded by police during hostage-taking in Blainville

Suspect suffered non-life threatening injuries

A 45-year-old man is recovering after he was shot by a police officer in Blainville Monday night January 23.

According to Quebec’s police watchdog, which is investigating the incident, the man walked into a Familiprix pharmacy armed with an X-Acto knife and a firearm, which was later determined to be fake.

He pointed the fake gun at a customer and

ordered them to leave, says the province’s independent investigations bureau (BEI).

He then took a female employee hostage, the BEI says. She sustained minor injuries.

When police arrived at the scene, one of the officers shot the man. He suffered non-life threatening injuries and was brought to hospital.

The Sûreté du Québec is providing two forensic identification technicians to assist

with the investigation. Eight of the BEI’s own investigators have been assigned to the case.

The BEI, which probes deaths or serious injuries involving police, is asking anyone who witnessed what happened to contact them [via their website](http://www.bei.gouv.qc.ca/); <https://www.bei.gouv.qc.ca/>

Early diagnosis; improved quality of life

Did you know that because of the aging population, it is estimated that around 1.4 million Canadians will suffer from Alzheimer's disease over the next 20 years? Unfortunately, fear of the disease and prejudice against it often prevent affected people from seeking help. Consequently, about half of Canadians wait too long to be diagnosed, not realizing that early diagnosis can greatly improve their quality of life and that of their families.

It is important to consult a doctor when you notice memory loss, difficulty performing daily tasks, or mood or behaviour changes. Contrary to popular belief, these symptoms are not part of the normal aging process. When Alzheimer's disease is diagnosed early, people are able to make their own decisions concerning their health care. The treat-

ment is also more effective when administered in the early stages. Similarly, early diagnosis allows patients to learn more about the disease, to seek support, and plan for the future according to their personal priorities.

The stigma of Alzheimer's is partly to blame for the fact that people are reluctant to ask for help. For that reason, the Alzheimer Society of Canada invites the public to speak openly about the disease during January, Alzheimer Awareness Month. As more attention is given to Alzheimer's the easier it will be to overcome prejudices and correct the misinformation that often circulates about it. Alzheimer: ten signs to watch for

Most people associate Alzheimer's disease with memory loss. However, this condition has several other symptoms, some of which are not as well known. During Alzheimer Awareness Month, take a few minutes to learn about this disease's ten leading symptoms.

- 1. SUDDEN MOOD CHANGES**
Example: being euphoric and then angry for no apparent reason.
- 2. DISORIENTATION**
Example: getting lost in a shopping mall you're familiar with.
- 3. DIFFICULTY PERFORMING ROUTINE TASKS**
Example: taking several minutes to tie your shoes.
- 4. SIGNIFICANT DIFFICULTY REMEMBERING PAST EVENTS OR RETAINING NEW FACTS**
Example: forgetting appointments.
- 5. DECREASED JUDGMENT**
Example: wearing sandals outside during the winter.
- 6. PERSONALITY CHANGE**
Example: feeling in danger.
- 7. REDUCED INITIATIVE**
Example: isolating yourself from others or no longer participating in leisure activities.
- 8. LOSS OF UNDERSTANDING OF ABSTRACT OR MATHEMATICAL CONCEPTS**
Example: no longer understand-

ing what the buttons on a remote control are used for.

9. RANDOM STORAGE OF OBJECTS
Example: putting an ornament in the freezer.

10. INAPPROPRIATE USE OF WORDS
Example: calling a cushion a cat.

Watch out for these signs. When in doubt, consult a doctor in order to undergo screening for Alzheimer's disease. Remember that the earlier the diagnosis is established, the sooner it will be possible to find the best way of controlling the symptoms.

Alzheimer's disease affects memory as well as speech, personality, mood and judgment.







But that's not what you are saying. You are saying things are so much under your control you can execute plans for the future at your leisure. You can't defend yourself from doing wrong by listing what someone else did wrong. That's a child's argument. "Billy started it."

We can't tell if your husband is jealous because he is jealous, or if his jealousy is simply an observation. "I know you don't have the scruples I do." If it wasn't in your nature to consider cheating, the last thing you would want to do would be to prove him right.

If he is "physically abusive," why would you put your kids and yourself in jeopardy? If that's a fact, why aren't you alarmed and why do you still call him "my hubby."

Be honest with yourself. Who drove this relationship

to marriage? We ask because the one who drives a marriage to occur is often the one who will drive it to divorce. That party can so easily disconnect because it is a matter of what they wanted then and what they want now.

You paint your husband with an ugly brush, but you don't claim he would cheat. We suppose you think you are the aggrieved party here, but aggrieved parties don't get to respond by committing fraud and adultery.






